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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to acupuncture; reordering and amending s. 457.102, F.S.; revising definitions and defining terms; amending s. 457.105, F.S.; revising licensure requirements for acupuncturists; eliminating certain examination fees; providing construction; creating s. 457.106, F.S.; providing applicability; amending s. 457.107, F.S.; revising requirements for continuing education programs for acupuncturists; amending s. 457.1085, F.S.; deleting obsolete language; amending s. 457.116, F.S.; prohibiting persons not licensed to practice acupuncture from using specified titles or letters in connection with their names or places of business; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 457.102, Florida Statutes, is reordered and amended to read:

457.102 Definitions.—As used in this chapter:

(1) "Acupuncture" means a form of primary health care, based on traditional Chinese medical concepts and modern <u>Eastern</u> oriental medical techniques, which that employs acupuncture diagnosis and treatment, as well as adjunctive therapies and diagnostic techniques, for the promotion, maintenance, and restoration of health and the prevention of disease. Acupuncture <u>includes</u> shall include, but <u>is</u> not be limited to, the insertion of acupuncture needles and the application of moxibustion to

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specific areas of the human body and the use of electroacupuncture, Qi Gong, $\underline{Eastern}$ oriental massage, herbal therapy, dietary guidelines, and other adjunctive therapies, as defined by board rule.

- (2) "Acupuncturist" and "acupuncture physician" means a non-physician practitioner of the healing arts any person licensed under as provided in this chapter to practice acupuncture as a primary health care provider.
 - (3) "Board" means the Board of Acupuncture.
- (5) "Direct supervision" means the immediate, onsite supervision of one or more licensed acupuncture physicians where the acupuncture physician assumes legal liability, either individually or collectively, for the supervised actions.
 - (6) "Dry needling" means trigger point acupuncture.
- $\underline{(8)}$ "License" means the document of authorization issued by the department for a person to engage in the practice of acupuncture.
 - $\underline{\text{(4)}}$ "Department" means the Department of Health.
- (7) (6) "Eastern Oriental medicine" means the use of a healing art that employs assessment, health history, physical examination, and acupuncture diagnosis and diagnostic techniques, including referral for diagnostic imaging and clinical laboratory testing, to evaluate, manage, and correct an abnormal health condition using acupuncture, electroacupuncture, Qi Gong, Eastern oriental massage, herbal therapy, dietary guidelines, acupoint injection, manual therapy, and other adjunctive therapies.
- (9) "Practice of acupuncture" means providing primary health care and treatment services that apply traditional

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Chinese medical concepts, anatomy and physiology, and modern
Eastern medical techniques using acupuncture and Eastern
medicine to identify, evaluate, and manage abnormal health
conditions for the promotion, maintenance, and restoration of
health, and the prevention of human disease as set forth in this
chapter. The practice of acupuncture includes, but is not
limited to, the stimulation of points, areas of the body, and
tissues using needles, devices, dry needling, and other means
defined by board rule; the exercise of prescriptive rights as
set forth in this chapter; and the use of adjunctive therapies
as defined by board rule.

(10) (7) "Prescriptive rights" means the prescription, administration, and use of needles and devices, restricted devices, and prescription devices and the recommendation for, or ordering or administration of, herbs, homeopathic remedies, and other nutritional supplements in sterile form, clinical lab tests and diagnostic imaging that are used in the practice of acupuncture and Eastern oriental medicine unless otherwise prohibited by state or federal law or regulation. For the purposes of this definition, herbs, homeopathic remedies, and other nutritional supplements in sterile form include, but are not limited to, products specially compounded or manufactured commercially for injection by means of a hypodermic needle, including vitamins, minerals, lipids, sugars, carbohydrates, amino acids, natural compounds, natural substances, and local anesthetics.

Products excluded for use under this definition are ophthalmic or oral inhalation drugs in aqueous format, corticosteroids,

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antibiotics, vaccinations, botulinum toxin, and controlled substances defined under chapter 893, or other medications not used for the practice of acupuncture.

Section 2. Subsection (2) of section 457.105, Florida Statutes, as amended by section 8 of chapter 2024-243, Laws of Florida, is amended, and subsection (3) is added to that section, to read:

457.105 Licensure qualifications and fees.-

- (2) A person may become licensed to practice acupuncture if the person applies to the department and meets all of the following criteria:
- (a) Is 21 years of age or older, has good moral character, and has the ability to communicate in English, which is demonstrated by having passed the national written examination in English or, if such examination was passed in a foreign language, by also having passed a nationally recognized English proficiency examination.
- (b) Has completed 60 college credits from an accredited postsecondary institution as a prerequisite to enrollment in an authorized 3-year course of study in acupuncture and oriental medicine, and has completed a 3-year course of study in acupuncture and oriental medicine, and effective July 31, 2001, a 4-year course of study in acupuncture and Eastern oriental medicine, which meets standards established by the board by rule, including which standards include, but are not limited to, successful completion of academic courses in Western anatomy, Western physiology, Western pathology, Western biomedical terminology, first aid, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). However, any person who enrolled in an authorized course of

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study in acupuncture before August 1, 1997, must have completed only a 2-year course of study which meets standards established by the board by rule, which standards must include, but are not limited to, successful completion of academic courses in western anatomy, western physiology, and western pathology.

- (c) Has successfully completed a board-approved national examination and certification process \underline{or}_{7} meets the requirements for licensure by endorsement under s. 456.0145_{7} or passes an examination administered by the department, which examination tests the applicant's competency and knowledge of the practice of acupuncture and oriental medicine. At the request of any applicant, traditional oriental nomenclature for the points must be used in the examination. The examination must include a practical examination of the knowledge and skills required to practice modern and traditional acupuncture and Eastern oriental medicine, covering diagnostic and treatment techniques and procedures.
- (d) Pays the required fees set by the board by rule not to exceed the following amounts:
- 1. Examination fee: \$500 plus the actual per applicant cost to the department for purchase of the written and practical portions of the examination from a national organization approved by the board.
 - 2. Application fee: \$300.
- 3. Reexamination fee: \$500 plus the actual per applicant cost to the department for purchase of the written and practical portions of the examination from a national organization approved by the board.
 - 2.4. Initial biennial licensure fee: \$400, if licensed in

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the first half of the biennium, and \$200, if licensed in the second half of the biennium.

- (e) Submits to background screening in accordance with s. 456.0135.
- (3) This section does not prohibit an acupuncturist licensed in another state, the District of Columbia, or a possession or territory of the United States from performing acupuncture procedures or demonstrating equipment or supplies for educational purposes at a board-approved continuing education program.
- Section 3. Section 457.106, Florida Statutes, is created to read:
 - 457.106 Exemptions.—This chapter does not apply to:
- (1) Other duly licensed health care practitioners acting within their authorized scope of practice.
- (2) An acupuncture student enrolled in an acupuncture college or program accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Acupuncture and Herbal Medicine Education who is participating in either:
- (a) A community-based internship or externship under the direct supervision of a licensed acupuncturist who is credentialed as an adjunct faculty member of an acupuncture college in which the student is enrolled; or
- (b) An acupuncture college clinical internship under the direct supervision of a licensed acupuncturist who is a full-time, part-time, or adjunct faculty member of an acupuncture college or program located in this state which is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Acupuncture and Herbal Medicine and who holds a current, active acupuncturist's license under

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this chapter.

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(3) An acupuncturist who holds an active license in another state, the District of Columbia, or a possession or territory of the United States and is performing acupuncture procedures or demonstrating equipment or supplies for educational purposes at a board-approved continuing education program.

Section 4. Subsection (3) of section 457.107, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

457.107 Renewal of licenses; continuing education.-

(3) The board shall prescribe by rule continuing education requirements of up to 30 hours biennially as a condition for renewal of a license. All education programs must be approved by the board and that contribute to the advancement, extension, or enhancement of professional skills and knowledge related to the practice of acupuncture, whether conducted by a nonprofit or profitmaking entity, are eligible for approval. The continuing professional education requirements must be in acupuncture or Eastern oriental medicine subjects, including, but not limited to, anatomy, biological sciences, adjunctive therapies, sanitation and sterilization, emergency protocols, and diseases, or in practice management. The board may set a fee of up to \$100 for each continuing education provider. The licensee shall retain in his or her records the certificates of completion of continuing professional education requirements. All national and state acupuncture and Eastern oriental medicine organizations and acupuncture and Eastern oriental medicine schools are approved to provide continuing professional education in accordance with this subsection.

Section 5. Section 457.1085, Florida Statutes, is amended

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to read:

457.1085 Infection control.—Prior to November 1, 1986, The board shall adopt rules relating to the prevention of infection, the safe disposal of any potentially infectious materials, and other requirements to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public. Beginning October 1, 1997, All acupuncture needles that are to be used on a patient must be sterile and disposable, and each needle may be used only once.

Section 6. Subsection (1) of section 457.116, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

457.116 Prohibited acts; penalty.-

- (1) A person may not:
- (a) Practice acupuncture unless the person is licensed under ss. 457.101-457.118;
- (b) Use, in connection with his or her name or place of business, any title or description of services which incorporates the words "acupuncture," "acupuncture physician," "acupuncturist," "certified acupuncturist," "licensed acupuncturist," "oriental medical practitioner"; the letters "A.P.," "D.Ac.," "DAOM," "D.O.M.," "L.Ac.," or "R.Ac.," "A.P.," or "D.O.M."; or any other words, letters, abbreviations, or insignia indicating or implying that he or she practices acupuncture unless he or she is a holder of a valid license issued pursuant to ss. 457.101-457.118;
 - (c) Present as his or her own the license of another;
- (d) Knowingly give false or forged evidence to the board or a member thereof;
- (e) Use or attempt to use a license that has been suspended, revoked, or placed on inactive or delinquent status;

237	Section 7. This act shall take effect July 1, 2025.
