Nothing in This section <u>does not</u> shall be deemed to 466 prohibit the association of a licensed practitioner with a 467 multidisciplinary group of licensed health care professionals, 468 the primary objective of which is the diagnosis and treatment of 469 the human body.

A No licensed practitioner may not shall engage in the 470 (b) practice of optometry with any corporation, organization, group, 471 or lay individual. This paragraph does provision shall not 472 473 prohibit licensed practitioners from employing, or from forming 474 partnerships or professional associations with, licensed 475 practitioners licensed in this state or with other licensed 476 health care professionals, the primary objective of whom is the 477 diagnosis and treatment of the human body.

478 A No rule of the board may not shall forbid the (C) 479 practice of optometry in or on the premises of a commercial or 480 mercantile establishment. Notwithstanding this paragraph, a 481 commercial or mercantile establishment or other such entity may 482 not have any control over the manner in which a licensee under 483 this chapter practices optometry. Any violation of this 484 paragraph will be deemed as unlicensed practice of optometry as specified in s. 463.015(1)(a). Individual owners, officers, or 485 486 directors of any commercial or mercantile establishment or other

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487 <u>such entity in violation of this section will be deemed to have</u> 488 committed the unlicensed practice of optometry.

489 A No licensed practitioner may not practice under (d) 490 practice identification names, trade names, or service names, 491 unless any dissemination of information by the practitioner to 492 consumers contains the name under which the practitioner is licensed or that of the professional association in which the 493 494 practitioner participates. Any advertisement or other 495 dissemination of information to consumers may contain factual 496 information as to the geographic location of licensed 497 practitioners or of the availability of optometric services.

(e) <u>A</u> No licensed practitioner <u>may not</u> shall adopt and publish or cause to be published any practice identification name, trade name, or service name which is, contains, or is intended to serve as an affirmation of the quality or competitive value of the optometric services provided at the identified practice.

504 (4) Surgery of any kind is expressly prohibited. Certified 505 optometrists may remove superficial foreign bodies. For the 506 purposes of this subsection, the term "superficial foreign bodies" means any foreign matter that is embedded in the 507 508 conjunctiva or cornea but that has not penetrated the globe. 509 Notwithstanding the definition of surgery as provided in s. 510 463.002(6), a certified optometrist is not prohibited from providing any optometric care within the practice of optometry 511 696613 - h0449 line 53.docx

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512 as defined in s. 463.002(7), such as removing an eyelash by 513 epilation, probing an uninflamed tear duct in a patient 18 years 514 of age or older, blocking the puncta by plug, or superficial 515 scraping for the purpose of removing damaged epithelial tissue 516 or superficial foreign bodies or taking a culture of the surface 517 of the cornea or conjunctiva.

518 <u>(4)(5)</u> <u>A</u> No rule of the board <u>may not shall</u> prohibit a 519 licensed practitioner from authorizing a board-certified 520 optician to fill, fit, adapt, or dispense a contact lens 521 prescription as authorized under chapter 484.

524 463.009 Supportive personnel.-No person other than a licensed practitioner may engage in the practice of optometry as 525 526 defined in s. 463.002 s. 463.002(7). Except as provided in this 527 section, under no circumstances shall nonlicensed supportive 528 personnel be delegated diagnosis or treatment duties; however, such personnel may perform data gathering, preliminary testing, 529 530 prescribed visual therapy, and related duties under the direct 531 supervision of the licensed practitioner. Nonlicensed personnel, 532 who need not be employees of the licensed practitioner, may 533 perform ministerial duties, tasks, and functions assigned to them by and performed under the general supervision of a 534 licensed practitioner, including obtaining information from 535 536 consumers for the purpose of making appointments for the 696613 - h0449 line 53.docx

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537 licensed practitioner. The licensed practitioner shall be 538 responsible for all delegated acts performed by persons under 539 her or his direct and general supervision.
