8	health, well-being, and economic prosperity, and
9	WHEREAS, this state's strong economy and unprecedented
10	growth has resulted in an increasing demand for water and has
11	increasingly impacted to this state's water resources, and
12	WHEREAS, the residents of this state place a premium on
13	clean water, springs, lakes, coastal estuaries, and other
14	environmental resources, and
15	WHEREAS, this state's spring, lake, estuary, and wetland
16	systems include some of the most productive and diverse
17	ecosystems in the world, and
18	WHEREAS, this state's waterways provide some of this
19	nation's best recreational destinations and support significant
20	commercial, recreational, and sustenance fisheries, and
21	WHEREAS, this state's national rank as a top three producer
22	of agricultural products and agricultural production depends on
23	adequate water supplies, and
24	WHEREAS, despite this state's strong water resource
25	protection framework, approximately 67 percent of this state is

26 categorized as water resource caution areas, and more than 2,000 27 water bodies are designated as impaired for water quality, and 28 WHEREAS, historically, water management practices have 29 addressed water supply, wastewater, and stormwater separately, 30 leading to inefficiencies and missed opportunities for resource 31 optimization, and

32 WHEREAS, projected water shortages, water quality issues, 33 and environmental impacts can be addressed through integrated 34 planning, infrastructure investments, conservation, and 35 integrated water resource management, and

36 WHEREAS, the Florida One Water Commission, composed of a 37 cross-section of stakeholders, supports a one-water approach to 38 water resource management, and

39 WHEREAS, this state's public water utilities and other 40 water users are beginning to regionally manage all water 41 resources in a way that balances demand, supply, and 42 environmental protection, and

43 WHEREAS, public water utilities and other users are 44 increasingly turning to a one-water strategy, valuing all water 45 through a collaborative and integrated systems approach to 46 managing all fresh and brackish surface and groundwater, 47 stormwater, wastewater, and recycled water in a holistic and 48 sustainable manner that maintains ecosystems while providing 49 reliable and resilient water resources that support economic, 50 environmental, and public benefits, NOW, THEREFORE,
