### ANALYSIS

#### **EFFECT OF THE BILL:**

The bill defines "medical institutions of higher education" as state universities that offers bachelor's, master's, or doctoral degrees, receives state funds, and offer health care-related degrees, certification programs, or training. It requires such institutions to implement a standardized admission test that evaluates knowledge of, and critical thinking skills for, science and medical training as a condition for admission.

## **RELEVANT INFORMATION**

#### **SUBJECT OVERVIEW:**

#### **Board of Governors**

The State University System of Florida consists of 12 public universities,<sup>1</sup> each governed by an individual board of trustees.<sup>2</sup> The Board of Governors (BOG) is responsible for overseeing, regulating, and managing the entire state university system.<sup>3</sup> Through its authority, the BOG ensures affordable access to higher education, promotes articulation with other educational institutions, and upholds fiscal responsibility and accountability across Florida's public universities.<sup>4</sup> The BOG consists of 17 members, 14 of which are "citizens" appointed by the

Governor, subject to Senate confirmation.<sup>5</sup> The commissioner of education, the chair of the advisory council of faculty senates, and the president of the Florida student association are also members.<sup>6</sup>

#### **Medical College Admissions Test**

The Medical College Admissions Test (MCAT) is a standardized, multiple-choice examination designed to assess problem-solving, critical thinking, and knowledge of natural, behavioral, and social science concepts and principles prerequisite to the study of medicine.<sup>7</sup> The exam is divided into four sections:

- Chemical and physical foundations of biological systems: Tests knowledge of basic chemistry, physics, and biochemistry concepts as they apply to biological systems.
- Critical analysis and reasoning skills: Assesses comprehension, analysis, and reasoning skills through passages from social sciences and humanities disciplines.
- Biological and biochemical foundations of living systems: Evaluates understanding of biological and biochemical concepts, processes, and mechanisms.
- Psychological, social, and biological foundations of behavior: Measurers knowledge of behavioral and sociocultural determinants of health and behavior.<sup>8</sup>

Each section is scored between 118 and 132, with a total score range of 472 to 528.<sup>9</sup> The MCAT is administered by the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) and is a requirement for admission to most medical schools in the United States and many in Canada.<sup>10</sup>

In addition, the PCS narrowed the standardized admission test requirement to apply only to state universities.
