1 House Resolution

A resolution recognizing the 80th anniversary of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion.

WHEREAS, recruiting began in late 1944 for the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, an all-black unit of the Women's Army Corps (WAC) and the only such WAC unit to be stationed overseas during World War II, who were deployed to the European theater in 1945, and

WHEREAS, the "Six Triple Eight," as the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion was known, consisted of five companies, totaling 855 women, and was led by Major Charity Adams, and

WHEREAS, at least 23 women of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion were Florida residents, including:

WHEREAS, many sergeants of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion were trained as medical technicians, having worked in hospitals before their selection for the battalion, and

WHEREAS, more than 3.3 billion pieces of mail went through military postal services to the front lines in 1945 alone, yet a lack of qualified postal officers led to a backlog of more than 17 million pieces of mail and packages, many often mislabeled or incorrectly addressed, and

WHEREAS, the lack of communication from families, friends, and loved ones in the United States was having a measurable impact on troop morale on the front lines, with some personnel not having received mail in more than 6 months, and

WHEREAS, to eliminate the impact that the lack of communication was having on troop morale, the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion was assigned to Birmingham, England and the battalion had 6 months to complete the task of sorting, cataloguing, and delivering the backlog of mail, and

WHEREAS, despite working in derelict buildings in dangerous territory, without adequate lighting or heat, the women of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion worked around the

clock, sorting roughly 195,000 pieces of mail a day, and completed their assignment in 90 days, and

WHEREAS, the women of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion accomplished this extraordinary feat while overcoming segregation, meager rations, and harsh conditions, and

WHEREAS, in June 1945, the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion was relocated to Rouen, France, to continue its mission, beginning its work a few weeks after victory was declared in Europe, and the women cleared a similarly sized mail backlog as quickly as they did in England, and

WHEREAS, the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion was awarded the Congressional Gold Medal in 2022, a recognition of the battalion's training and meritorious service which also acknowledged the racism and sexism of the times, and

WHEREAS, the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion's efficiency, dedication, and hard work provided a valuable and essential wartime service to the United States, especially to the many thousands of soldiers and their families, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

That, in recognition of the battalion's 80th anniversary, the women of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion are
