House Resolution

A resolution recognizing May 15, 2025, as "Josiah T. Walls Day" in the State of Florida.

5 WHEREAS, Josiah T. Walls was likely born enslaved on 6 December 30, 1842, near Winchester, Virginia, and

7 WHEREAS, after having been impressed into service for the 8 Confederate Army and captured at the Battle of Yorktown, Josiah 9 Walls voluntarily enlisted in the Union Army in July 1863 as 10 part of the 3rd Infantry Regiment of United States Colored Troops (USCT), was stationed in Union-occupied northern Florida 11 12 in February 1864, and subsequently transferred to the 35th Regiment of the USCT, rising to the rank of Sergeant Major and 13 14 serving as an artillery instructor, and

15 WHEREAS, after his discharge from military service in 16 October 1865, Walls decided to remain in Florida and became a 17 farmer, and

18 WHEREAS, in 1868, Walls was elected to represent the people 19 of Alachua County in Florida's constitutional convention, 20 playing a role in the drafting of the constitution that was 21 adopted that same year, and was also elected to the Florida 22 House of Representatives, again representing Alachua County, and

23 WHEREAS, in 1869, Walls was elected to the Florida Senate,
24 representing the 13th District, and

25 WHEREAS, despite allegations that he was unfit for public 26 service due to his status as a former slave, Walls became the 27 first Black Floridian elected to the United States House of 28 Representatives in 1870 and was sworn in as a member of the 42nd 29 Congress on March 4, 1871, where he served on the Committee on 30 the Militia, and

31 WHEREAS, Walls entered Congress as one of seven Black 32 Americans to be the first to serve in our nation's House of 33 Representatives, and although politics in Florida were 34 tumultuous during Reconstruction, filled with overt racism and 35 punctuated by violence, he was reelected to Congress in 1872 and 36 1874, and

37 WHEREAS, a passionate advocate for Florida, Congressman 38 Walls introduced at least 51 bills, including several that directly benefitted this state by calling for a railroad 39 40 construction land grant, seeking improvement of harbor and river 41 transportation, securing new mail routes, protecting the budding 42 fruit industry, and securing 90,000 acres of land for the 43 Florida Agricultural College, which partnered with the East 44 Florida Seminary at Gainesville to become the University of the 45 State of Florida, now known as the University of Florida, and

WHEREAS, after leaving Congress, Walls returned to
Gainesville and was appointed to the Alachua County Commission,
on which he served as President *pro tempore*, and

49	WHEREAS, Walls was subsequently reelected to the Florida
50	Senate, serving two terms in 1877 and 1879, and
51	WHEREAS, after once more returning home to Gainesville,
52	Walls was suddenly left in financial ruin after a frost ravaged
53	his farm and killed all of its orange trees, but through his
54	tenacity and determination, Walls persevered and applied his
55	farming experience to a successful career as the administrator
56	of the farm at the Florida Normal College and Industrial College
57	for Colored Students, now known as the Florida Agricultural and
58	Mechanical University, and
59	WHEREAS, Josiah T. Walls died in Tallahassee on May 15,
60	1905, NOW, THEREFORE,
