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26 to allow such evaluation or inspection as a violation 27 of a legal obligation; revising rulemaking authority of the board; deleting a provision authorizing 28 approved nursing education programs to request an 29 extension to meet the board's accreditation 30 requirements; providing an effective date. 31 32 33 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 34 35 Subsections (1), (2), (3), (5), (8), and (10) Section 1. 36 and paragraph (f) of subsection (11) of section 464.019, Florida 37 Statutes, are amended to read: 464.019 Approval of nursing education programs.-38 39 PROGRAM APPLICATION. - An educational institution that (1)wishes to conduct a program in this state for the prelicensure 40 41 education of professional or practical nurses must submit to the 42 department a program application and review fee of \$1,000 for 43 each prelicensure nursing education program to be offered at the institution's main campus, branch campus, or other instructional 44 45 site. The program application must include the legal name of the educational institution, the legal name of the nursing education 46 program, the legal name of the nursing education program 47 48 director, and, if such institution is accredited, the name of 49 the accrediting agency. The application must also document that: 50 (a)1. For a professional nursing education program, the

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51 program director and at least 50 percent of the program's 52 faculty members are registered nurses who have a master's or 53 higher degree in nursing or a bachelor's degree in nursing and a 54 master's or higher degree in a field related to nursing.

55 2. For a practical nursing education program, the program 56 director and at least 50 percent of the program's faculty 57 members are registered nurses who have a bachelor's or higher 58 degree in nursing.

The educational degree requirements of this paragraph <u>must</u> may be documented by an official transcript or by a written statement from <u>the program director of</u> the educational institution verifying that the institution conferred the degree. <u>The program director shall certify the official transcript or</u> written statement as true and accurate.

(b) The program's nursing major curriculum consists of atleast:

68 1. Fifty percent clinical training in the United States, 69 the District of Columbia, or a possession or territory of the 70 United States for a practical nursing education program, an 71 associate degree professional nursing education program, or a 72 professional diploma nursing education program.

73 2. Forty percent clinical training in the United States,
74 the District of Columbia, or a possession or territory of the
75 United States for a bachelor's degree professional nursing

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76 education program.

(c) No more than 50 percent of the program's clinicaltraining consists of clinical simulation.

(d) The program has signed agreements with each agency, facility, and organization included in the curriculum plan as clinical training sites and community-based clinical experience sites.

(e) The program has written policies for faculty which
include provisions for direct or indirect supervision by program
faculty or clinical preceptors for students in clinical training
consistent with the following standards:

The number of program faculty members equals at least
 one faculty member directly supervising every 12 students unless
 the written agreement between the program and the agency,
 facility, or organization providing clinical training sites
 allows more students, not to exceed 18 students, to be directly
 supervised by one program faculty member.

93 2. For a hospital setting, indirect supervision may occur 94 only if there is direct supervision by an assigned clinical 95 preceptor, a supervising program faculty member is available by 96 telephone, and such arrangement is approved by the clinical 97 facility.

98 3. For community-based clinical experiences that involve
99 student participation in invasive or complex nursing activities,
100 students must be directly supervised by a program faculty member

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101 or clinical preceptor and such arrangement must be approved by 102 the community-based clinical facility.

4. For community-based clinical experiences not subject to subparagraph 3., indirect supervision may occur only when a supervising program faculty member is available to the student by telephone.

108 A program's policies established under this paragraph must 109 require that a clinical preceptor who is supervising students in 110 a professional nursing education program be a registered nurse 111 or, if supervising students in a practical nursing education 112 program, be a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse.

The professional or practical nursing curriculum plan 113 (f) 114 documents clinical experience and theoretical instruction in 115 medical, surgical, obstetric, pediatric, and geriatric nursing. A professional nursing curriculum plan must shall also document 116 117 clinical experience and theoretical instruction in psychiatric 118 nursing. Each curriculum plan must document clinical training 119 experience in appropriate settings that include, but are not limited to, acute care, long-term care, and community settings. 120

(g) The professional or practical nursing education program provides theoretical instruction and clinical application in personal, family, and community health concepts; nutrition; human growth and development throughout the life span; body structure and function; interpersonal relationship

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126 skills; mental health concepts; pharmacology and administration 127 of medications; and legal aspects of practice. A professional 128 nursing education program must also provide theoretical 129 instruction and clinical application in interpersonal 130 relationships and leadership skills; professional role and 131 function; and health teaching and counseling skills.

132 (h) The professional or practical nursing education 133 program has established evaluation and standardized admission 134 criteria. The admission criteria must, at a minimum, identify 135 those students who are likely to need additional educational 136 support to be successful program graduates. The program must 137 maintain documentation of the individualized student academic support plan for those students identified as in need of 138 139 additional preparation and educational support.

140 The professional or practical nursing education (i) 141 program has an established comprehensive examination, known as 142 an exit examination, to prepare students for the National 143 Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing Examination. The 144 exit examination must be administered before program completion. 145 However, successful passage may not be required for graduation. 146 The program director is responsible for posting the average exit 147 examination results of the program on the program's website. (j) 148 The professional or practical nursing education 149 program has submitted to the board the established criteria for remediation that will be offered to students who do not 150

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151 successfully pass the exit examination. 152 (2) PROGRAM APPROVAL.-153 (a) Upon receipt of a program application and review fee, the department shall examine the application to determine if it 154 155 is complete. If the application is not complete, the department 156 must shall notify the educational institution in writing of any 157 errors or omissions within 30 days after the department's 158 receipt of the application. A program application is deemed 159 complete upon the department's receipt of: 160 1. The initial application, if the department does not 161 notify the educational institution of any errors or omissions 162 within the 30-day period; or 163 2. A revised application that corrects each error and 164 omission of which the department notifies the educational 165 institution within the 30-day period. Following the department's receipt of a complete 166 (b) 167 program application, the board may conduct an onsite evaluation 168 if necessary to document the applicant's compliance with 169 subsection (1). Within 90 days after the department's receipt of 170 a complete program application, the board shall: 171 Approve the application if it documents compliance with 1. 172 subsection (1); or Provide the educational institution with a notice of 173 2. intent to deny the application if it does not document 174 175 compliance with subsection (1). The notice must specify written Page 7 of 17

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176 reasons for the board's denial of the application. The board may 177 not deny a program application because of an educational 178 institution's failure to correct an error or omission that the 179 department failed to provide notice of to the institution within 180 the 30-day notice period under paragraph (a). The educational 181 institution may request a hearing on the notice of intent to 182 deny the program application pursuant to chapter 120.

(c) A program application is deemed approved if the board
does not act within the 90-day review period provided under
paragraph (b).

(d) Upon the board's approval of a program application,the program becomes an approved program.

188 (e) The board shall deny an application from a program
189 that has had adverse action taken against it by another
190 regulatory jurisdiction in the United States. The board may also
191 revoke the approval of an existing approved program that has had
192 adverse action taken against it by another regulatory
193 jurisdiction in the United States.

(3) ANNUAL REPORT.-By November 1 of each year, each approved <u>program's director</u> program shall submit to the board an annual report comprised of an affidavit certifying continued compliance with subsection (1), a summary description of the program's compliance with subsection (1), and documentation for the previous academic year that, to the extent applicable, describes:

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(a) The number of student applications received, qualified
applicants, applicants accepted, accepted applicants who enroll
in the program, students enrolled in the program, and program
graduates.

(b) The program's retention rates for students trackedfrom program entry to graduation.

207 (c) The program's accreditation status, including208 identification of the accrediting agency.

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(d) The program's average exit examination results.

211 The board must terminate the program pursuant to chapter 120 if 212 the requirements of this subsection are not met. The program 213 director is also subject to discipline under s. 456.072(1)(k) 214 for such failure.

(5) ACCOUNTABILITY.-

(a)1. An approved program must achieve a graduate passage 216 217 rate for first-time test takers which is not more than 10 218 percentage points lower than the average passage rate during the 219 same calendar year for graduates of comparable degree programs 220 who are United States educated, first-time test takers on the 221 National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing 222 Examination, as calculated by the contract testing service of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. For purposes of 223 this subparagraph, an approved program is comparable to all 224 225 degree programs of the same program type from among the

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226 following program types: 227 Professional nursing education programs that terminate a. 228 in a bachelor's degree. Professional nursing education programs that terminate 229 b. 230 in an associate degree. 231 с. Professional nursing education programs that terminate 232 in a diploma. 233 d. Practical nursing education programs. 234 2. An approved program with graduate passage rates which 235 do not equal or exceed the required passage rate for the most 236 recent calendar year must offer remediation to students who do 237 not successfully pass the program's exit examination at no additional cost or pay for remediation from a board-approved 238 239 remedial program. 240 3.2. If an approved program's graduate passage rates do 241 not equal or exceed the required passage rates for 1 calendar 242 year 2 consecutive calendar years, the board must shall place 243 the program on probationary status pursuant to chapter 120 and 244 the program director must submit a written remediation plan to 245 the board. The program director must shall appear before the 246 board to present the a plan for remediation, which must shall include specific nationally recognized benchmarks to identify 247 248 progress toward a graduate passage rate goal. The board must 249 terminate a program pursuant to chapter 120 if the program 250 director fails to submit a written remediation plan or fails to

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251 appear before the board and present the remediation within 6 252 months after the program is placed on probation. The program's 253 director is also subject to discipline under s. 456.072(1)(k) 254 for such failure. The program must remain on probationary status 255 until it achieves a graduate passage rate that equals or exceeds 256 the required passage rate for any 1 calendar year. The board 257 must shall deny a program application for a new prelicensure 258 nursing education program submitted by an educational 259 institution if the institution has an existing program that is 260 already on probationary status.

4.3. Upon the program's achievement of a graduate passage 261 262 rate that equals or exceeds the required passage rate, the 263 board, at its next regularly scheduled meeting following release 264 of the program's graduate passage rate by the National Council 265 of State Boards of Nursing, shall remove the program's 266 probationary status. If the program, during the 2 calendar year 267 years following its placement on probationary status, does not 268 achieve the required passage rate for any 1 calendar year, the 269 board must may extend the program's probationary status for 1 270 additional year, provided the program has demonstrated adequate 271 progress toward the graduate passage rate goal by meeting a 272 majority of the benchmarks established in the remediation plan. 273 If the program is not granted the 1-year extension or fails to 274 achieve the required passage rate by the end of such extension, 275 the board shall terminate the program pursuant to chapter 120.

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276 If an approved program's graduate passage rate is below 5. 277 30 percent in a calendar year, the program must reimburse the 278 total cost of tuition and fees paid by each student who failed 279 to pass the National Council of State Boards of Nursing 280 Licensing Examination as a first-time test taker in that 281 calendar year. The program must outline its plan for meeting 282 this requirement in its written remediation plan under 283 subparagraph (5) (a) 3.

284 If an approved program fails to submit the annual (b) 285 report required in subsection (3), the board must shall notify the program director and president or chief executive officer of 286 287 the educational institution in writing within 15 days after the due date of the annual report. The program director must shall 288 289 appear before the board at the board's next regularly scheduled 290 meeting to explain the reason for the delay. The board must 291 shall terminate the program pursuant to chapter 120 if the 292 program director fails to appear before the board, as required 293 under this paragraph, or if the program does not submit the 294 annual report within 6 months after the due date.

(c) A nursing education program, whether accredited or nonaccredited, which has been placed on probationary status <u>must</u> shall disclose its probationary status in writing to the program's students and applicants. The notification must include an explanation of the implications of the program's probationary status on the students or applicants.

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301 If students from a program that is terminated pursuant (d) 302 to this subsection transfer to an approved or an accredited 303 program under the direction of the Commission for Independent 304 Education, the board must shall recalculate the passage rates of 305 the programs receiving the transferring students, excluding the 306 test scores of those students transferring more than 12 credits. 307 (e) For each student who fails to pass the National 308 Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing Examination as a 309 first-time test taker, and for at least 1 calendar year 310 following his or her graduation date, an approved program on 311 probationary status must offer such student remediation at no 312 additional cost to the student or pay for remediation from a 313 board-approved remedial program. 314 (f) Duly authorized agents or employees of the department 315 may conduct onsite evaluations or inspections at all reasonable 316 hours to verify that approved programs or accredited programs 317 are in full compliance with this chapter, or to determine whether this chapter or s. 456.072 is being violated. The 318 319 department may collect any necessary evidence needed to verify 320 compliance with this chapter or for prosecution as deemed 321 necessary. The failure of a program to allow an onsite evaluation or inspection is deemed a violation of a legal 322 323 obligation imposed by the board or the department. 324 (8) RULEMAKING.-The board does not have rulemaking 325 authority to administer this section, except that the board

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326 shall adopt rules that prescribe the format for submitting 327 program applications under subsection (1) and annual reports 328 under subsection (3), to enforce and administer subsection (5), 329 and to administer the documentation of the accreditation of 330 nursing education programs under subsection (11). The board may 331 adopt rules relating to the nursing curriculum, including rules 332 relating to the uses and limitations of simulation technology, 333 and rules relating to the criteria to qualify for an extension 334 of time to meet the accreditation requirements under paragraph 335 (11) (f). The board may not impose any condition or requirement 336 on an educational institution submitting a program application, 337 an approved program, or an accredited program, except as 338 expressly provided in this section.

339 (10) IMPLEMENTATION STUDY.-The Florida Center for Nursing 340 shall study the administration of this section and submit 341 reports to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the 342 Speaker of the House of Representatives annually by January 30. 343 The annual reports shall address the previous academic year; 344 provide data on the measures specified in paragraphs (a) and 345 (b), as such data becomes available; and include an evaluation 346 of such data for purposes of determining whether this section is 347 increasing the availability of nursing education programs and the production of quality nurses. The department and each 348 approved program or accredited program shall comply with 349 350 requests for data from the Florida Center for Nursing.

372	(b) The Florida Center for Nursing shall evaluate the
373	board's implementation of the:
374	1. Program application approval process, including, but
375	not limited to, the number of program applications submitted
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376 under subsection (1), the number of program applications 377 approved and denied by the board under subsection (2), the 378 number of denials of program applications reviewed under chapter 379 120, and a description of the outcomes of those reviews.

2. Accountability processes, including, but not limited to, the number of programs on probationary status, the number of approved programs for which the program director is required to appear before the board under subsection (5), the number of approved programs terminated by the board, the number of terminations reviewed under chapter 120, and a description of the outcomes of those reviews.

(c) The Florida Center for Nursing shall complete an annual assessment of compliance by programs with the accreditation requirements of subsection (11), include in the assessment a determination of the accreditation process status for each program, and submit the assessment as part of the reports required by this subsection.
