28	Section 2. Compensation of correctional officers,

31	(1) The Legislature finds that:
32	(a) Correctional officers, correctional probation

response roles for qualified correctional officers, correctional probation officers, and institutional security specialists during state or federal emergencies.

- (c) Establish fair and consistent annual pay raises that reflect economic realities.
- (d) Guarantee permanent pay equity protection for correctional officers, correctional probation officers, and institutional security specialists.
- (3) (a) Beginning July 1, 2030, the average salary for correctional officers, correctional probation officers, and institutional security specialists may not be less than 97 percent of the average salary of sworn officers employed by law enforcement agencies of this state, including the Florida Highway Patrol, the Department of Law Enforcement, and the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.
- (b) By July 1 of each year beginning in 2027, the

 Department of Management Services shall submit an annual

 compensation analysis report to the Governor, the President of
 the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives to

 measure progress toward the goal of this section and continued
 compliance with this section.
- (4) (a) Beginning with the 2026-2027 fiscal year, and each fiscal year thereafter, sworn law enforcement officers, correctional officers, correctional probation officers, and institutional security specialists shall receive an annual

salary increase of at least 3 percent.

(b) The salary increase in paragraph (a) shall be made in addition to any bonuses and merit, retention, or parity increases separately authorized by law or policy.

Section 3. Subsections (9) through (12) of section 252.36, Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (10) through (13), respectively, and new subsection (9) is added to that section to read:

- 252.36 Emergency management powers of the Governor.-
- (9) (a) In the event of a declared state or federal emergency, the Governor may issue an executive order for up to 60 days which authorizes correctional officers, correctional probation officers, and institutional security specialists to assist state or federal agencies, including, but not limited to, the United States Department of Homeland Security and United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement in enforcement or support operations.
- (b) To be eligible for the authorization in paragraph (a), a correctional officer, correctional probation officer, or institutional security specialist must:
 - 1. Be actively employed by the state.
- 2. Be certified by the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission.
- 3. Have at least 5 years of continuous service in a fulltime capacity as a correctional officer, correctional probation
