A bill to be entitled

An act relating to home inspectors; amending s. 468.8313, F.S.; revising elements of the required course of study for home inspectors; amending s. 468.8314, F.S.; conforming a provision to changes made by the act; amending s. 468.8316, F.S.; revising continuing education requirements for home inspectors; amending s. 468.8321, F.S.; revising home inspector disclosure requirements; amending s. 468.8322, F.S.; requiring home inspectors to maintain an errors and omissions insurance policy in a specified amount; revising the required amount of general liability insurance coverage home inspectors must maintain; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (2) of section 468.8313, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

468.8313 Examinations.-

(2) An applicant may practice in this state as a home inspector if he or she passes the required examination, is of good moral character, and completes a course of study of at least 150 120 hours that covers all of the following components of a home: structure, electrical system, HVAC system, roof covering, plumbing system, interior components, exterior components, and site conditions that affect the structure. The course of study must also cover state insurance inspections, wind mitigation, four-point inspections, and roof

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certifications. A minimum of 8 hours must cover the basics of the Florida Building Code and a minimum of 8 hours must cover report writing, including a practical component.

Section 2. Subsection (3) of section 468.8314, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

468.8314 Licensure.-

- (3) The department shall certify as qualified for a license by endorsement an applicant who is of good moral character as determined in s. 468.8313, who maintains an insurance policies policy as required by s. 468.8322, and who:
- (a) Holds a valid license to practice home inspection services in another state or territory of the United States, whose educational requirements are substantially equivalent to those required by this part; and has passed a national, regional, state, or territorial licensing examination that is substantially equivalent to the examination required by this part; or
- (b) Has held a valid license to practice home inspection services issued by another state or territory of the United States for at least 10 years before the date of application. Such application must be made either when the license in another state or territory is active or within 2 years after such license was last active.

Section 3. Subsection (1) of section 468.8316, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

468.8316 Continuing education.

(1) The department may not renew a license until the licensee submits proof satisfactory to the department that during the $\frac{3}{2}$ years before application for renewal the licensee

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completed at least $\underline{20}$ $\underline{14}$ hours of continuing education. Of the $\underline{20}$ $\underline{14}$ hours, at least $\underline{4}$ $\underline{2}$ hours must be in hurricane mitigation training that includes hurricane mitigation techniques and compliance with the uniform mitigation verification inspection form developed under s. 627.711(2) and at least 2 hours must be in Florida Building Code requirements. The department shall adopt rules establishing criteria for approving continuing education providers and courses.

Section 4. Section 468.8321, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

468.8321 Disclosures.—<u>Before Prior to</u> contracting for or commencing a home inspection, a home inspector shall provide to the consumer a copy of his or her license <u>or license number</u> to practice home inspection services in this state and a written disclosure that contains the scope and any exclusions of the home inspection.

Section 5. Section 468.8322, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

468.8322 Insurance.—A home inspector shall maintain a commercial general liability insurance policy and an errors and omissions insurance policy in an amount of not less than \$500,000 per policy \$300,000.

Section 6. This act shall take effect July 1, 2026.
