## SUMMARY

### Effect of the Bill:

The bill provides an exception to the Beverage Law to authorize licensed vendors in the Lake Wales Arts, Culture, and Entertainment District to sell alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption within the district.

## ANALYSIS

### EFFECT OF THE BILL:

The bill provides an exception to the [Beverage Law](#) to authorize licensed vendors in the [Lake Wales Arts, Culture, and Entertainment District](#) (District) to sell alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption within the District. The bill provides the beverages may be sold in an open container for off-premise consumption regardless of the type of alcoholic beverage license they hold and without the need for additional licenses. (Section [1](#))

The bill specifies that vendors making such sales must still comply with all other local ordinances, state alcoholic beverage laws, and rules of the Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco within the Department of Business and Professional Regulation. (Section [2](#))

The bill provides a metes-and-bounds property description of the District. (Section [3](#))

Subject to the Governor's veto powers, the effective date of this bill is upon becoming a law. (Section [4](#))

## RELEVANT INFORMATION

### SUBJECT OVERVIEW:

#### Beverage Law

Florida's Beverage Law<sup>1</sup> regulates the manufacture, distribution, and sale of wine, beer, and liquor by manufacturers, distributors, and vendors.<sup>2</sup> The Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco within the Department of Business and Professional Regulation administers and enforces the Beverage Law.<sup>3</sup> Under the Beverage Law, there is no limit on the number of licenses the division may issue to businesses selling malt beverages or wine. However, the number of licenses for selling liquor or distilled spirits is limited to one license per 7,500 residents within a county with a minimum of three licenses per county that has approved the sale of intoxicating liquors.<sup>4</sup> These licenses are known as quota licenses and are the only alcoholic beverage license type that is limited in number.<sup>5</sup>

There are several exceptions to the quota license limitation, and businesses that meet the requirements for an exception may be issued a special license by the division, allowing the business to serve any alcoholic beverages regardless of alcohol content.

Alcoholic beverages sold for consumption on premises must be consumed inside the licensed premises.<sup>6</sup> The division may approve a temporary expansion of the licensed premises to include a sidewalk or other outdoor areas for special events. The business must pay an application fee of \$100, stipulate the timeframe for the special event, submit a sketch outlining the expanded premises, and submit written approval from the county or municipality.

### **Lake Wales Arts, Culture, and Entertainment District**

The Lake Wales City Council created the Lake Wales Arts, Culture, and Entertainment District by ordinance in August 2025 to promote the economic development of the downtown area of the City of Lake Wales.<sup>7</sup> The city desired to attract and retain businesses and to create a walkable and pedestrian friendly downtown area. The ordinance amended several of the city's existing ordinances to allow outside consumption of alcoholic beverages within District boundaries. These new ordinances were intended to support and enhance cultural event programming, restaurants, music venues, and arts institutions located within the District.

### **Local Bill Forms**

The Florida Constitution prohibits the passage of any special act unless a notice of intention to seek enactment of the bill has been published as provided by general law or the act is conditioned to take effect only upon approval by referendum vote of the electors in the area affected.<sup>8</sup> A legal advertisement of the proposed bill must be placed in a newspaper of general circulation or published on a publicly accessible website<sup>9</sup> at least 30 days prior to the introduction of the local bill in the House or Senate.<sup>10</sup> The bill was noticed on the publicly accessible website of [Polk County](#) and the [City of Lake Wales on October 31, 2025](#).

The House local bill policy requires a completed and signed Local Bill Certification Form and Economic Impact Statement Form be filed with the Clerk of the House at the time the local bill is filed or as soon thereafter as possible.<sup>11</sup> Under the policy, a committee or subcommittee may not consider a local bill unless these forms have been filed.
