SUMMARY

Effect of the Bill:

The bill provides an exception to the ban on using private funds or services for election-related activities to allow high school students, who are registered or preregistered to vote, to volunteer at polling places for community service hours that count toward meeting high school graduation or scholarship program requirements.

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ANALYSIS

EFFECT OF THE BILL:

The bill provides that the [prohibition on the use of private funds for election-related expenses](#) does not ban high school students who are registered or [preregistered to vote](#) from volunteering to assist poll workers for the purpose of receiving [community service hours](#) that count toward meeting high school graduation or scholarship program requirements. The effective date of this bill was July 1, 2026; however, this bill was vetoed by the Governor on June 25, 2026. (Section [2](#))

RELEVANT INFORMATION

SUBJECT OVERVIEW:

[Prohibition on Use of Private Funds for Election-related Expenses](#)

Current law prohibits an agency or state or local official responsible for conducting elections¹ from soliciting, accepting, using, or disposing of any donation in the form of money, grants, property, or personal services from an individual or a nongovernmental entity for the purpose of funding any type of expenses related to election administration.² This prohibition does not apply when an individual or nongovernmental entity donates space to be used for a polling room or an early voting site.³

[Preregistered to Vote](#)

A person may preregister to vote if he or she is at least 16 years old and meets all the general voter registration qualifications.⁴ The preregistration becomes an active registration on or after a person's 18th birthday.⁵ Then, the

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appropriate supervisor of elections is required to mail the registrant a voter registration card and the person is deemed eligible to vote.⁶

Community Service Hours

Every year Florida's high school students may participate in various programs that have a community service hour component. One such program is the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program (Bright Futures), which is a lottery-funded initiative that supports high school graduates pursuing degrees, certificates, or applied technology programs at eligible postsecondary institutes.⁷ The Bright Futures initiative has four distinct scholarship awards that require volunteer service hours, paid work hours, or a combination of both:⁸

- Florida Academic Scholarship: Requires an applicant to complete 100 volunteer hours; 100 paid work hours; or a combination of 100 total hours of volunteer and work hours.
- Florida Medallion Scholarship: Requires an applicant to complete 75 volunteer hours; 100 paid work hours; or a combination of 100 total hours of volunteer and work hours.
- Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship: Requires an applicant to complete 30 volunteer hours;⁹ 100 paid work hours; or a combination of 100 total hours of volunteer and work hours.
- Gold Seal Cape Scholarship: Requires an applicant to complete 30 volunteer hours;¹⁰ 100 paid work hours; or a combination of 100 total hours of volunteer and work hours.
