- 2. Identification and location information held by an agency is exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution if the current or former civilian contractor,

government employee, or military personnel member submits to an agency that has custody of the identification and location information:

a. A written request to exempt the identification and location information from public disclosure; and

- b. A written statement that he or she has made reasonable efforts to protect the identification and location information from being accessible through other means available to the public.
- 3. This exemption applies to identification and location information held by an agency before, on, or after the effective date of this exemption.
- 4. This paragraph is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act in accordance with s. 119.15 and shall stand repealed on October 2, $\underline{2031}$ $\underline{2029}$, unless reviewed and saved from repeal through reenactment by the Legislature.
- Section 2. The Legislature finds that it is a public necessity that the identification and location information of current and former civilian contractors and government employees who are authorized to access information that is deemed "secret" or "top secret" by the Federal Government, and their spouses and dependents, which is held by an agency be made exempt from s.

 119.07(1), Florida Statutes, and s. 24(a), Article I of the State Constitution. Such current and former civilian contractors and government employees are at risk of being threatened by

terrorist groups because of their access to such information.

The Legislature finds that allowing continued public access to the identification and location information of such current and former civilian contractors and government employees, and their spouses and dependents, jeopardizes the safety of such personnel and their spouses and dependents. The Legislature further finds that protecting the safety and security of such current and former civilian contractors and government employees, and their spouses and dependents, outweighs any public benefit that may be derived from the public disclosure of the identification and location information.

Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2026.
