A bill to be entitled

An act relating to mental health programs for gun violence prevention; creating s. 394.4997, F.S.; providing legislative findings and intent; requiring IMPACT GNV of the City of Gainesville, in collaboration with certain entities, to develop and implement the Gun Violence Prevention Pilot Program; providing eligibility and program requirements; providing alternatives to incarceration for specified youth; providing for referrals to specified programs; requiring the City of Gainesville, in collaboration with Alachua County, to annually submit a specified report to IMPACT GNV by a specified date; requiring IMPACT GNV to report specified information to the Governor and the Legislature by a specified date; providing for expiration of the pilot program; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 394.4997, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

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394.4997 Gun Violence Prevention Pilot Program.—

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(1) LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND INTENT.—The Legislature finds that persons under 21 years of age in this state are disproportionately affected by gun violence, which has

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significant adverse effects on the health, safety, and well-

29 being of persons under 21 years of age. Further, the Legislature

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30 finds that mental health challenges and unresolved conflicts are 31 contributing factors to the prevalence of gun violence and that 32 there is a need for targeted mental health and conflict 33 resolution education programs to assist persons under 21 years 34 of age in mitigating these issues. It is the intent of the 35 Legislature to establish programs that provide mental health 36 services tailored to the needs of persons under 21 years of age, 37 implement conflict resolution training in schools and community centers to prevent violence, and fund community-based 38 39 initiatives that address the root causes of gun violence among 40 persons under 21 years of age.

(2) CREATION.-

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- (a) IMPACT GNV of the City of Gainesville shall develop and implement a Gun Violence Prevention Pilot Program in the City of Gainesville, in collaboration with the Department of Juvenile Justice, the state attorney, and the public defender of the Eighth Judicial Circuit.
- (b) The pilot program shall provide mental health services, community-based intervention programs, conflict resolution training, and alternative opportunities.
- (c) IMPACT GNV shall design the pilot program to align with and complement existing efforts in the City of Gainesville to address gun violence among youth and young adults. IMPACT GNV shall, at a minimum, consult with stakeholders before and during implementation of the pilot program.
- (3) ELIGIBILITY.—In order to become an eligible program participant, he or she must be:
- (a) A person who is at least 10 to 21 years of age, who is at moderate or high risk of being:

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- 59 1. A victim of gun violence;
  - 2. An offender who has inflicted bodily harm or death; or
  - 3. An individual returning to the community from a delinquency residential program; or
  - (b) A family member of a person eligible under paragraph

    (a).
    - (4) PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS.—The program shall:
  - (a) Provide program participants with access to mental health services, including, but not limited to, all of the following:
  - 1. Individual therapy sessions with qualified professionals or mental health counselors to address personal mental health issues.
  - 2. Facilitated group therapy sessions to provide peer support and shared experiences.
  - 3. Family therapy sessions involving family members to address familial issues contributing to mental health problems.
  - 4. Trauma-focused cognitive behavioral therapy for participants who have experienced trauma.
  - 5. Art and music therapies to help participants express emotions and cope with stress.
  - 6. Substance abuse treatment programs addressing substance abuse issues that may contribute to violent behavior.
    - 7. Mediation training.
    - 8. Restoration of relationships.
    - 9. Resilience and leadership skills.
  - (b) In collaboration with the Department of Juvenile

    Justice, the state attorney, and the public defender for the

    Eighth Judicial Circuit, provide program participants who are

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involved with the delinquency system or on probation with
opportunities to obtain:

- 1. A graduate equivalency degree.
- 2. Job training, skills development, or an apprenticeship.
- 3. Employment at high-risk or critical need positions.
- (5) REFERRAL.—
- (a) The public defender's office will receive referrals to the dependency program.
- (b) The state attorney's office will receive referrals to the diversion program under part III of chapter 985.
- (c) The Department of Juvenile Justice will receive referrals to the class for firearm offenders under s. 985.601(11).
  - (6) REPORTS.-
- (a) Beginning October 31, 2027, and annually thereafter, the City of Gainesville, in collaboration with Alachua County, shall report to IMPACT GNV and the Department of Juvenile

  Justice the number of participants in the pilot program; data on the impact on the rate of gun violence among individuals within the age group and geographic area served by the program; data on risk factors for gun violence in the geographic area served by the program; feedback from program participants; and recommendations for improvement and expansion of services based on the results of the pilot program.
- (b) IMPACT GNV shall report to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by December 31 of each year on the implementation and performance of the program.
  - (7) REPEAL.—This section expires June 30, 2030.

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117	Section 2. For the 2026-2027 fiscal year, the sum of
