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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to autism spectrum disorder; amending s. 393.063, F.S.; revising the definition of the term "autism"; amending s. 1012.582, F.S.; requiring, rather than authorizing, the State Board of Education to adopt certain rules; requiring that such rules include a requirement related to autism spectrum disorder for certain K-12 teachers; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (5) of section 393.063, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

393.063 Definitions.—For the purposes of this chapter, the term:

(5) "Autism" and "autism spectrum disorder" mean means a condition as defined by the most recent edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders of the American Psychiatric Association pervasive, neurologically based developmental disability of extended duration which causes severe learning, communication, and behavior disorders with age of onset during infancy or childhood. Individuals with autism exhibit impairment in reciprocal social interaction, impairment in verbal and nonverbal communication and imaginative ability,

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and a markedly restricted repertoire of activities and interests.

Section 2. Subsection (4) of section 1012.582, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

- 1012.582 Continuing education and inservice training for teaching students with developmental and emotional or behavioral disabilities.—
- (4) (a) The State Board of Education shall may adopt rules pursuant to ss. 120.536(1) and 120.54 to implement this section.
- (b) Such rules must require a K-12 teacher who teaches a class with at least 50 percent of students having autism spectrum disorder to hold an Autism Spectrum Disorder Endorsement.
- (c) Such rules must allow for an exception to the Autism Spectrum Disorder Endorsement requirement in paragraph (b) if a teacher holds an Endorsement in Severe or Profound Disabilities, has taught students with autism spectrum disorder for a minimum of 3 years, and has been rated as highly effective in the preceding 3-year period pursuant to s. 1012.34.
 - Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2026.
