Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 468.502, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

468.502 Purpose and intent.—The Legislature finds that the practice of dietetics and the practice of nutrition or nutrition counseling by unskilled and incompetent practitioners presents a danger to the public health and safety. The Legislature further finds that it is difficult for the public to make informed choices about dietitians and nutritionists and that the consequences of wrong choices could seriously endanger the public health and safety. The sole legislative purpose in enacting this part is to ensure that every person who practices medical nutrition therapy dietetics and nutrition or nutrition counseling in this state meets minimum requirements for safe practice. It is the legislative intent that any person practicing as a dietician or a nutritionist dietetics and nutrition or nutrition counseling who falls below minimum competency or who otherwise presents a danger to the public be

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prohibited from practicing in this state. It is also the intent of the Legislature that the practice of medical nutrition
therapy nutrition counseling be authorized and regulated solely within the limits expressly provided by this part and any rules adopted pursuant thereto.

Section 2. Section 468.503, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

468.503 Definitions.—As used in this part:

- (1) "Board" means the Board of Medicine.
- (2) "Commission" means the Commission on Dietetic Registration, the credentialing agency of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics.
- (3) "Complex" means a disease state, medical condition, or clinical presentation that requires medical nutrition therapy by a licensed dietitian due to one or more of the following:
 instability of the patient's health status; the presence of
 multiple or interacting comorbidities; a high risk of
 complications or rapid clinical deterioration; the need for
 intensive monitoring; or the need for advanced nutrition

It is an integral part of preventive, diagnostic, curative, and restorative health care of individuals, groups, or both.
- (5) "Dietetics and nutrition practice" shall include assessing nutrition needs and status using appropriate data; recommending appropriate dietary regimens, nutrition support, and nutrient intake; ordering therapeutic diets; improving health status through nutrition research, counseling, and education; and developing, implementing, and managing nutrition care systems, which includes, but is not limited to, evaluating, modifying, and maintaining appropriate standards of high quality in food and nutrition care services.
- (6) "Dietetic technician" means a person who assists in the provision of dietetic and nutrition services under the

- and systematic process of ordering, obtaining, verifying, and interpreting biochemical, anthropometric, physical, nutrigenomic, and dietary data to make decisions about the nature and cause of nutrition-related problems relative to patient and community needs. Nutrition assessment includes, but is not limited to, initial data collection, ordering laboratory tests to check and track nutritional status, reassessment and analysis of patient or community needs, and providing the foundation for nutrition diagnosis and nutritional recommendations and orders. The collection of nutrition-related data does not, by itself, constitute nutrition assessment.
- (16) "Nutrition care process" means the systematic problem-solving method that licensed dietitians use to make decisions when providing medical nutrition therapy or when addressing nutrition-related problems and to provide safe and effective care. The nutrition care process includes nutrition assessment, nutrition diagnosis, nutrition intervention, and nutrition monitoring and evaluation.
- (17) "Nutrition care services" means all of the following services provided within a nutrition care process:
- (a) Assessing and evaluating the nutritional needs of individuals and groups and determining resources and constraints in a practice setting, including ordering nutrition-related

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laboratory tests to check and track nutrition status.

- (b) Identifying nutrition problems and establishing priorities, goals, and objectives that meet nutritional needs and are consistent with available resources and constraints.
- (c) Creating individualized dietary plans and issuing and implementing orders to meet nutritional needs of healthy individuals and individuals with disease states or medical conditions, including ordering therapeutic diets and monitoring the effectiveness of such diets.
- (d) Determining and providing appropriate nutrition intervention, including nutrition counseling on food and prescription drug interactions.
- (e) Developing, implementing, and managing nutrition care systems.
- (f) Evaluating, making changes, and maintaining appropriate standards of quality in food and nutrition services.
- (18) "Nutrition counseling" means a supportive process, characterized by a collaborative counselor-patient relationship with individuals or groups, to establish food and nutrition priorities, goals, and individualized action plans and general physical activity guidance, that acknowledge and foster responsibility for self-care, to promote health and wellness or to treat or manage an existing disease or medical condition.
- (19) "Nutrition diagnosis" means identifying and labeling nutrition problems managed and treated by a licensed dietitian

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or licensed nutritionist. The term does not include a medical diagnosis of the health status of an individual.

- (20) "Nutrition intervention" means purposefully planned actions, including nutrition counseling, intended to positively change a nutrition-related behavior, risk factor, environmental condition, or aspect of health status of an individual, and his or her family or caregivers, target groups, or community at large. The term includes approving, ordering, and monitoring therapeutic diets, and counseling on food and prescription drug interactions.
- (21) "Nutrition monitoring and evaluation" means identifying patient outcomes relevant to the nutrition diagnosis, intervention plans, and goals and comparing those outcomes with previous status, intervention goals, or a reference standard to determine the progress made in achieving desired outcomes of nutrition care and whether planned interventions should be continued or revised.
- (22) "Patient" means an individual recipient of nutrition care services.
- (23) "Practice of dietetics" means the integration and application of scientific principles derived from the study of food, nutrition, biochemistry, metabolism, nutrigenomics, physiology, pharmacology, food systems, management, and behavioral and social sciences to achieve and maintain optimal nutrition status of individuals and groups across a lifespan.

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The practice of dietetics includes providing nutrition care services, including medical nutrition therapy, in person or through telehealth to prevent, manage, or treat complex diseases or medical conditions and promote wellness in inpatient and outpatient settings. The practice of dietetics includes developing and ordering therapeutic diets through oral, enteral, and parenteral routes and providing medical nutrition therapy and related support activities consistent with current competencies required of academic and supervised practice programs accredited by the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics and in compliance with the Commission on Dietetic Registration's Scope and Standards of Practice for the Registered Dietitian Nutritionist.

application of scientific principles derived from the study of nutrition science, cellular and systemic metabolism, biochemistry, physiology, and behavioral sciences to support and maintain health throughout a lifespan. The practice of nutrition includes providing nutrition care services, including medical nutrition therapy, in person or through telehealth for the prevention, management, or treatment of noncomplex diseases and medical conditions in low-acuity outpatient settings and for the promotion of wellness. The practice of nutrition does not include medical nutrition therapy for complex conditions and the delivery of medical nutrition therapy in inpatient or high-

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acuity outpatient settings. The practice of nutrition, consistent with level of competence, may include ordering of oral therapeutic diets; ordering of medical laboratory tests related to nutrition interventions; and recommending vitamin, mineral, and other dietary supplements.

- (25) "Qualified supervisor" means an individual providing supervision who assumes full professional responsibility for the work of the student or trainee by verifying, directing, and approving the provided nutrition care services, medical nutrition therapy, and other activities or services being supervised.
- (a) To qualify as a qualified supervisor for purposes of this chapter, an individual shall meet all the following requirements:
- 1. Only supervise a clinical activity or nutrition care service for which the qualified supervisor is authorized to perform.
- 2. Develop and carry out a program for advancing and optimizing the quality of care provided by the student or trainee being supervised. A qualified supervisor and a student or trainee being supervised shall identify and document goals for supervised practice experiences, the assignment of clinical tasks as appropriate to the progressing competence level of the student or trainee, the relationship of and access to the student or trainee to the qualified supervisor, and a process

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for evaluating the performance of the student or trainee.

- 3. Oversee the activities of and approve and accept responsibility for the nutrition care services provided by the student or trainee.
- 4. At a minimum, be physically onsite and present where the student or trainee is providing nutrition care services or be immediately and continuously available to the student or trainee by means of two-way, real-time audiovisual communication that allows for the direct, contemporaneous interaction by sight and sound between the qualified supervisor and the student or trainee. If the qualified supervisor assigns a nutrition care service to a student or trainee that is to be provided in a setting where the qualified supervisor is not routinely present, the qualified supervisor shall ensure that the means and methods of supervision are adequate to ensure appropriate patient care, which may include synchronous videoconferencing or other methods of communication and oversight that are appropriate to the care setting and the education and experience of the student or trainee.
- 5. Review on a regular basis the charts, records, and clinical notes of the student or trainee, and maintain responsibility for the clinical recordkeeping of the student or trainee.
- 6. Be available to render assistance while a student or trainee is providing nutrition care services when requested by

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the patient or shall have arranged for another qualified practitioner, lawfully able to render nutrition care services, to be available in the absence of the qualified supervisor.

- 7. Limit the assignment of nutrition care services to those services that are within the training and experience of the student or trainee and customary to the practice of the qualified supervisor.
- (b) A qualified supervisor shall satisfy the requirements in paragraph (a) and, if supervising medical nutrition therapy, shall:
- 1. Be licensed or certified as a dietitian, nutritionist, dietitian nutritionist, or healthcare provider whose scope of practice includes medical nutrition therapy in the state or territory in which such supervised practice experience occurs;
- 2. Meet other criteria established by board rule or regulation when a state in which the supervised practice occurs does not provide for licensure or certification of dietitians, dietitian nutritionists, or nutritionists; or
 - 3. Meet the exemption requirements of s. 468.505(b).
- (26) "Registered dietitian" means a person who is credentialed by the Commission on Dietetic Registration or its successor organization as a registered dietitian or a registered dietitian nutritionist and is authorized to use such title and the abbreviations "RD" or "RDN."

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and telecommunications technologies to provide services under this chapter between a practitioner in one location and an patient in another location to support clinical health care, public health, health-related education, and health administration.

Council members shall be appointed by the board. Licensed members shall be appointed based on the proportion of licensees within each of the respective disciplines. Members shall be appointed for 4-year staggered terms. In order to be eligible for appointment, each licensed member must have been a licensee under this part for at least 3 years before prior to his or her appointment. A

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No council member may not shall serve more than two successive terms. The board may delegate such powers and duties to the council as it may deem proper to carry out the operations and procedures necessary to effectuate the provisions of this part. However, the powers and duties delegated to the council by the board must encompass both the practice of dietetics and the practice of nutrition dietetics and nutrition practice and nutrition counseling. - 3. The registration examination for dietitians administered by the Commission on Dietetic Registration, or its successor organization. If an applicant passed the examination

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more than 5 years before application, demonstration of completion of 75 hours of continuing education meeting the continuing education criteria of the board per each 5-year period post examination.

- (b) The applicant submits proof of holding a valid, current registration with the Commission on Dietetic Registration, or its successor organization, that gives the applicant the right to use the term "registered dietitian," "registered dietitian nutritionist," "RD," or "RDN."
- (2) Each applicant for licensure as a nutritionist shall submit a completed application as required by the board demonstrating the applicant is capable and professionally competent, as determined by the board, to safely engage in the practice of nutrition, submit any fees, as required by the board, submit to background screening in accordance with s. 456.0135, and submit proof of completion of all the following:
- (a) A master's degree or doctoral degree with a major in human nutrition, foods and nutrition, community nutrition, public health nutrition, nutrition education, nutrition, nutrition science, clinical nutrition, applied clinical nutrition, nutrition counseling, nutrition and functional medicine, nutritional biochemistry, nutrition and integrative health, or a comparable titled major, or a doctoral degree or validated foreign equivalent, in a field of clinical healthcare. The applicant shall complete coursework leading to competence in

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noncomplex medical nutrition therapy, which includes, but may not be limited to, the following:

- 1. Fifteen semester hours of courses on clinical or life sciences, including at least three semester hours in human anatomy and physiology or the equivalent.

- (b) A planned, documented, and continuous preprofessional experience component in the practice of nutrition approved by the examining board and meeting all the following requirements:
- 1. An applicant shall complete a preprofessional experience component under this paragraph within 5 years of completing the requirements under paragraph (a) unless the examining board, for extraordinary circumstances, grants an extension for a limited time.
- 2. A preprofessional experience completed under this paragraph shall involve at least 1,000 hours in the following practice areas, with a minimum of 200 hours in each practice area: nutrition assessment, nutrition intervention, and nutrition monitoring and evaluation.
- 3. Experience determined by the board to have prepared the applicant to provide nutrition care services for various populations of diverse cultures, genders, and across the life cycle, and to be able to competently provide medical nutrition

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therapies and interventions, education, counseling, and ongoing care for the prevention, modulation, and management of a range of noncomplex medical conditions.

- 4. A preprofessional experience completed under this paragraph under the supervision of a qualified supervisor as defined in s. 468.503.
 - (c) The examination requirements by demonstrating:
- 1. Passage of the certified nutrition specialist
 examination administered by the Board for Certification of
 Nutrition Specialists, or its successor organization, or an
 equivalent examination on all aspects of the practice of
 nutrition that has been reviewed under a program that requires a
 master's degree or higher, is accredited by the National
 Commission for Certifying Agencies, and is approved by the
