SUMMARY

Effect of the Bill:

The bill removes the requirement that validation stickers —the yellow registration decals—be placed on the license plates of a registered motor vehicle and authorizes motor vehicle registrations and renewals to be recorded and verified electronically.

Fiscal or Economic Impact:

The bill may have an indeterminate positive fiscal impact on state and local governments expenditures and an indeterminate economic impact on the private sector.

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ANALYSIS

EFFECT OF THE BILL:

The bill removes the requirement that [validation stickers](#) —the yellow registration decals—be placed on the license plates of a registered motor vehicle and authorizes motor vehicle registrations and renewals to be recorded and verified electronically. (Section [1](#))

The bill is effective July 1, 2026. (Section [6](#))

FISCAL OR ECONOMIC IMPACT:

STATE GOVERNMENT:

The bill may have an indeterminate positive fiscal impact on the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles as the department will no longer be required to provide, mail, or replace validation stickers for license plates.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT:

The bill may have an indeterminate positive fiscal impact on tax collectors as such entities will no longer be required to provide, mail, or replace validation stickers for license plates. For example, the Miami-Dade Tax Collectors Office estimates that going digital to record registrations and renewals will likely save the office \$2.5 million every year.¹

PRIVATE SECTOR:

The bill may have an indeterminate positive economic impact on license plate agents as such entities will no longer be required to issue, mail, or replace validation stickers for license plates. The bill may have an indeterminate

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negative economic impact on vendors that provide validation stickers, as the vendors’ product will no longer be authorized for use in Florida.

RELEVANT INFORMATION

SUBJECT OVERVIEW:

Validation Stickers

The Department of Highway Safety (DHSMV), tax collectors, and license plate agents² are involved in the process of motor vehicle registrations and renewals and issuing the validation stickers. DHSMV is required to provide the tax collectors and license plate agents with the necessary number of validation stickers.³

Current law provides that upon motor vehicle registration, and after payment of the appropriate license tax and fees, a motor vehicle owner or operator will receive a license plate⁴ and with each license plate, a validation sticker⁵ is issued. The validation sticker must be placed on the upper right corner of the license plate and must display the motor vehicle owner’s:

- Birth month.
- License plate number.
- Year of expiration or the appropriate renewal period if the owner is not a natural person.⁶

The license plate and validation sticker are issued based on the applicant’s appropriate renewal period. Generally, the registration period is 12 months, but an applicant may opt for an extended registration period of 24 months.⁷ For each registration period, after the initial one in which the license plate is issued, and until the license plate is required to be replaced, a validation sticker showing the month and year of expiration must be issued upon payment of the proper license tax amount and fees and is valid for the standard 12 months or the extended 24 months.⁸

The license plate and the validation sticker are a way for law enforcement to visually verify that a motor vehicle is legally registered and authorized to operate on Florida’s roads.⁹ Many law enforcement officers have the capability to verify motor vehicle registrations electronically using automated license plate recognition systems¹⁰ on their cars, which automatically read the license plates of passing motorists and show their registration data to the officer.
